2023 Sunflower Growing Competition



We are delighted that so many of you have taken up the challenge this year's Sunflower Growing Competition. We hope that you are all feeding, watering and possibly talking to your sunflowers to encourage them to grow! A reminder that the two competition categories are: a) Tallest sunflower and b) Widest flowerhead. Entries will be judged on the weekend of 12/13 August. 55 kits were given out late April/early May (32 junior members and 23 adults), so we're expecting to see sunflowers popping up all over. The bees will love it, too!

Plot-judging 2023

Thinking ahead WAHGA hopes to offer Churchfields allotment plot-holders the opportunity to put their plot forward for judging. As last year, we hope to have Julie Jacob, an instructor at Kew Gardens and Merrist Wood, and also a keen allotment gardener, to assess and judge the submitted plots. WAHGA Gardening Tips

Little and Often—Successional Sowing

One of the keys to a long-cropping season and a variety of crops is successional seed-sowing. It's often tempting to open a packet of seeds such as lettuce, beetroot, carrots or pak-choi and empty all of it in one long row, or in one large pot. But if you sow a third of the seeds now, a third in 2 weeks' time and a third 2 weeks after that, you can extend the season and enjoy the harvest over a longer period. It takes a bit of planning, but is well worth it!



Watering— Lots and not so often



When it comes to watering, it's better to give plants a really good soaking infrequently, than a sprinkle every day or two. Whilst seedlings are establishing themselves, use a rose on the watering can, but once plants have grown deeper roots you can ditch the rose, reduce the frequency of watering and increase the amount each time. This will keep the deeper soil moist and encourage the roots to go down further, providing better anchorage and allowing them to find more nutrients. And in this heat, it also reduces the amount lost to evaporation.

Did You know? Cane vs. beet sugar

For a few years now, I've been making marmalade and jam. Although I don't eat most of what I make, I find it therapeutic to cut up the citrus peel (by hand) and stir the pot to find that magical setting point. On one jam-making occasion I got to think about the "food miles" involved in getting the cane sugar from the Caribbean vs. the beet sugar from just up the road in East Anglia. And have you ever thought how amazing it is that you can get the same product from two totally different plants, grown in such different climatic conditions? The history is quite fascinating too with sugar production from beet being promoted by Napoleon after a blockade of French trade links limited the supply of cane sugar to Europe.
